GIVING IS A GIFT TO THE GIVER

I do love our country and its people, and that is why I am writing now on the topic. Let me state plainly, we could be far richer if we became a people of givers rather than amassers.



y mom was very sick and frail for most of my life, dying when I was a teenager. When I got married years later, I didn't know basic cooking techniques. Sew? What's that? Mother/daughter pedicures weren't something we experienced together. But the lessons my mom did teach me were much bigger and deeper – she taught me about faith. Even through constant, extreme pain and disappointments, she never swayed in her love and devotion to Jesus Christ. She followed God's call for her life in impossible circumstances. Only a life in Christ could possibly bring that outcome.

Now that I am a mom myself to three kids, it's easy to forget the lessons she taught me. It's easy to get caught up in daily things that don't really matter. Any parent can tell you kids are going to teach you a thing or two about both your sanity and sanctification. Being a mom to three kids has exposed weaknesses in my character like nothing else has. I also know as a mom that it is part of my privilege to pass my faith on, including lessons on fruits of the spirit, generosity, forgiveness and study of God's word. Honestly, the list goes on, and you just pray some of it will stick in their small, formidable hearts as their faith begins to form, that I can be an example of faith working itself out right in front of them. Caleb would have been my mom's first grandchild (if she were alive today, she would have 12, with one more on the way). When Caleb feels God calling him to something, he doesn't see limitations like we do. He just starts the work of doing what he has been called to do, an example of childlike faith. There is no embarrassment or second-guessing for him. How I wish I was more like that! When he told us he wanted



to start raising money for Peru, we said "Great." Then he told us he wanted to raise A LOT of money for Peru - \$100,000! We said in our hearts, "Not possible." Thankfully, we didn't say that out loud. Caleb started by selling his toys. For his birthday, he asked for cash and started doing extra chores to put his allowance toward this fund. As his passion grew, so did ours, and we knew we wanted to come alongside and rally our troops to help raise money for the amazing Scalpel mission. God used Caleb's faith to do a very big thing. Perhaps, even bigger than raising \$100,000 - he showed us what can happen when we follow through on God's calling, big or small. We are humbled by family, friends and people all over the country that gave generously.

This could not have been accomplished without the support of so many others who believe in Scalpel At The Cross and the Scalpel team.

Caleb, I want to be more like you when I grow up! You remind me what is most important - more important than a clean house or homecooked meal. It's faith in our creator God - that he will carry out in us what he calls us to do - as we are faithful to that call. My heart needs that reminder.

SCALPEL: A LIGHTHOUSE FOR CHRIST

im: Our introduction to Scalpel At The Cross in July of 2018 was unforget-table. My son Timmy, a soon-to-be college freshman, and I traveled to Pucallpa, Peru with a Scalpel medical team. Scalpel surgeons evaluated patients and performed 25 orthopaedic surgeries for Peruvians with crippling injuries, some heartbreakingly long-term. With each surgery we saw hope restored to patient and family. More than that, we told them about Jesus, the only source of real hope.

Given the high pace and focused goals of our trip, our understanding of Scalpel's spiritual impact was limited to the immediate work God placed in our team's path, including providing Bibles to and praying for families, sharing testimonies of God's goodness to local university students, and of course, physically treating broken bodies. We saw a glimpse of how God was using Scalpel to be a lighthouse for Christ.

Returning to Pucallpa this summer, we gained a more complete understanding of the powerful spiritual impact Scalpel has made over 17 years serving in the jungle. Timmy, now a college senior, spent six weeks living with local missionaries, working in the hospital and with Scalpel's Isaac Mendoza. I joined Timmy at the end of his stay. Living in the routines of missionary families and local Peruvians, we heard personal testimonies of Scalpel's gospel-mission in these additional ways:



1. Support for Local Missionaries:

Pucallpa is uniquely located as the gateway into the Amazon jungle, ripe for gospel-centered missions. Scalpel works side-by-side with several mission organizations, including Pioneers (sends missionaries to unreached tribal groups), Swiss Mission (trains local pastors and lay leaders), FAIENAP (plants churches) and SAM/SAMAIR (operates a missionary school and provides jungle air transportation). Repeatedly we heard of incredible stress and instability missionaries experience with ever-evolving circumstances. Amidst storms of unfamiliar obstacles, Scalpel's presence allows access to quick, reliable consultation, providing answers to questions, performing procedures, and connecting missionaries with excellent local doctors. Local missionary families explained the monumental blessing this has been and how it enables them to focus on their mission to reach people for Jesus Christ. Through years of Scalpel's ministry, key missionary connections have been formed through intentional listening, praying and sharing of stories to mutually encourage and motivate one another.

2. Gospel and Medical Collaboration with Hospital Staff:

Timmy: About 12 hours each week, I worked at Hospital Amazonico where Scalpel has operated in recent years. On breaks or over meals, Amazonico staff routinely shared fond memories of partnering with Scalpel and how Scalpel's boldness to share good news of Jesus, while caring for patients, has impacted them to do the same. The Peruvian surgeons consistently commented on the education and insights they have gleaned from observing Scalpel's operations and interacting with Scalpel's surgeons. Clearly, both spiritually and medically, Scalpel's impact extends far beyond the nine days a team is physically present.

3. The Ongoing Ministry of Isaac Mendoza:

Some most cherished moments were witnessing the immense faithfulness of Isaac Mendoza, a local Scalpel team member who makes prosthetics and performs follow-up physical therapy for patients. In addition to diligently caring for their physical needs, Isaac wholeheartedly loves Jesus. At his clinic, it is easy to see his heart for being a gospel witness: allowing people to give whatever they can afford and taking time to share salvation's hope with suffering individuals. Scalpel provides tools, training and funding for Isaac to effectively provide physical and spiritual care. The gospel goes forth to the people of Pucallpa through the ministry of Isaac and his family.

We praise God for how He is using Scalpel as a lighthouse to advance God's Kingdom and bring Him glory, and look forward with excitement for the ways God will use the new Miracle Campus to multiply those efforts.




INTRODUCING BRAD WHITE

THE BONE-O-METER


AN APPLICATION OF ABSOLUTE STABILITY


ABSOLUTE STABILITY IS WHAT A PERSON'S HEART DESIRES IN A WORLD OF EVER-INCREASING UNPREDICTABILITY. DAY-TO-DAY EVENTS CAN BE GRAY, BUT GOD PROMISES YOU THAT, LIKE A SPECIAL FRACTURE THAT FITS PERFECTLY TOGETHER, HE GIVES THE OPPORTUNITY FOR ABSOLUTE STABILITY IN OUR LIFE, THROUGH ACCEPTING JESUS. THE BONE-O-METER, WITH A PERFECTLY REDUCED BONE FIXED WITH SIX POINTS OF PURCHASE ABOVE AND BELOW THE FRACTURE, IS THE SYMBOL OF ABSOLUTE STABILITY IN ORTHOPAEDICS.

racture fixation is often far from black and white, which is evident to any orthopaedic resident, searching a text at 4 a.m., prior to presenting at morning fracture rounds. Even seasoned surgeons faced with a difficult operation will say things like, "fracture healing doesn't always follow the textbook." While my broadly-referenced text does not always provide a solution on how to specifically fix each bone-break, there are governing principals that guide treatment.

At the most basic level, bones heal through one of two primary pathways: endochondral or intramembranous healing. Endochondral healing occurs when there is less fixation stability, allowing for motion at a fracture site. Injured tissue first deposits cartilage which then gets replaced by bone cells within weeks. Casting is an example of an "unstable" fixation method which allows for this indirect type of healing.




Intramembranous healing is the situation in which a broken bone is perfectly aligned and compressed across the fracture site. Rigid plate fixation is an example of absolute stability which does not allow motion,




Absolute stability is what a person's heart desires in a world of ever-increasing unpredictability. Day to day events can be gray, but God promises you that, like a special fracture that fits perfectly together, He gives the opportunity for absolute stability in our life, through accepting Jesus. The Bone-O-Meter, with a perfectly reduced bone fixed with six points of purchase above and below the fracture, is the symbol of absolute stability in orthopaedics. It will be used as a graphic representation of progress during the Miracle Campus Capital Campaign. Perhaps, we should be reminded that, as the dollars raised pour into our journey, we can be assured of the absolute stability God offers us as a free gift.




2021 SATC YTD MISSION VITALS
