20 YEAR REFLECTIONS

Three primary surprises shine bright for me as I reflect on two Scalpel decades: precious people, palpable providence, and perfect protection. All three weave and mingle so intricately as if to prove a master's design, and that is precisely the point of Scalpel At The Cross.

It certainly didn't start out this way. There was no grand vision to become what it has become. We started out with a simple family project, a place we could call home in the jungle to visit with medical friends who were interested to work in an Amazon hospital to help hurting patients who otherwise have zero hope. The primary principle was simply to listen and remain open to what God wanted to do with us.

It took the partnership spirit of Craig and Heather Gahagen to give the idea of a modest medical mission some life. This like-minded couple became closest friends, and resided in the jungle as missionaries on a two-plane aviation base owned by South American Mission (SAM) in the 1990's; the four of us were downright dangerous I would say. *Precious people.*

It was a miracle that we captured a

chance to purchase some land from SAM to build a guest lodge to sleep sixteen, affectionately coming to be known as Jungle Bunks, directly inside the security gates of the compound. In fact half the land is under water half the year because of the Amazon rains which made it expendable for landing airplanes but perfect for us. The concept to sell to us had been blunted for years by those who would claim mission creep or loss of control, but a one-year window assignment of a SAM Field Director from a former hometown, gave us a green light to trigger the purchase; and we quickly plunged a flag into the ground. Palpable providence.

Although we have endured confiscated medical supplies, attacks on team members by venomous snakes and wild monkeys, a fair share of Machu Picchu's revenge, over a dozen flat tires, terrifying tarantulas, flight cancellations, broken autoclaves and stolen equipment, by God's grace and mercy we have never lost a patient despite so many major reconstructive surgeries, and we have brought all our hundreds of American travelers home in one piece.

Perfect protection.

20 YEAR REFLECTIONS

I am awestruck by the three Mission Directors who have blessed Scalpel At The Cross, each with more than five years of service. call them all, dear friends. *Precious people.*


Despite a model to date of occupying our guest lodge but two months a year, we've been able to avert the ever threatening phenomenon of squatting, the socialistic policy of the left-leaning headship of Peru, which legally protects invaders after occupying land or structure for more than a few weeks; and despite our all-wooden home standing on fifteen foot pilings above the high water mark, we've avoided disaster from fire and earthquake which frequent the region particularly in the dry season; and despite the density of Dengue and Malaria in the rainforest which is endemic, none of ours travelers has ever been stricken with the mosquito borne micro-organisms. Perfect protection.

After fifteen years and twenty-five surgical campaigns, I had Peruvian leaders from the community approach me with an appeal to grow Scalpel At The Cross to meet ministry and healthcare gaps in the region; a light went on for me—we had profound

local credibility. This realization was underscored by the simultaneous offer of a local Swiss Christian Mission organization to practically cede new land to Scalpel At The Cross with one request, use it for expansion of our medical services.

Palpable providence.

This is a tip-of-the-iceberg essay of a much longer play with many acts, casted by rich and talented actresses, ten thousand volunteers to which I often allude, a kaleidoscope of perfectly timed donations, glued together by beautiful new staff members and our passionate three kids. This twentieth year of Scalpel At The Cross, Nancy and I reach the 50% milestone of a forty year marriage; ministry and marriage, what better way to give thanks, serve others, follow our God? We are so grateful to all of you for doing this with us—it was a team effort. May God give us perfect protection to continue reminiscing and imagining, to give thanks and mingle with the precious people we love, at the divinely appointed times of palpable providence which grows our faith.


BRANDING REFRESH

The picture on the left depicts my inaugural journey to Pucallpa, at the age of six months old. As you can tell, I was a sizeable baby!

In the photos above, you'll find me at the age of 3, darting off and finding myself lost in a hut within the heart of the Amazon Jungle.

This past January in the vibrant city of Miami, a place dear to our hearts, Scalpel At The Cross celebrated 20 years since its inception. In life, there are often one or perhaps a few events that profoundly shape an individual. However, for me it was not merely a single moment, but rather a blessed upbringing of engaging experiences alongside the startup of this foundation. I feel the impact being made, not just to others, but even more so on myself.

What began as a modest family project and a childhood jungle gym, blossomed into a living organism that is growing before our very eyes. Scalpel transcends purely human construction; instead, it reflects God's divine presence that works through a collective to showcase His boundless love.




PRAISES

- Improved partnership with Hospital Amazónico during February's medical campaign to Pucallpa where we evaluated 84 patients who'd been triaged previously (due to the orthopaedic specialists in upper extremity on this team) and of which 39 were identified as potential surgical candidates, culminating in 30 highly complex, life changing surgeries delivered. Mil Palmeras Church co-labored in providing compassionate care to patients through prayer, gospel sharing, and discipleship connection to area churches. New with this campaign, and in response to a request from the Amazónico trauma team, Scalpel surgeons met with the Peruvian surgeons/interns prior to starting surgeries together, which allowed for greater understanding and patient review and translated into increased collaboration in our patient care model throughout the campaign. The hospital staff and local translators who partnered with us throughout the week also heard the plan of salvation at a luncheon we hosted prior to returning state side, during which time they were invited to accept Christ as their personal Lord & Savior. Team members were blessed, protected, encouraged, stretched, and deepened by this Amazon experience of "giving by going," and felt as though the blessings bestowed upon them by going far outweighed the sacrifices made to travel and serve.
- Outstanding March medical campaign to Pucallpa (under a new administrative lead) where we performed 23 successful surgeries.
 Our team of 17 volunteers from 5 states ensured every patient





- Exquisite January 26th Miracle for Peru Miami Fundraising Gala centering on magnifying the Lord's worth while building out our Miami headquarter's network. Dr. Ben Carson (accompanied by wife Candy), shared his riveting testimony of being raised in poverty by an illiterate, single mother with a third-grade education as well as the intricacies of his unprecedented triumph in successfully separating Siamese twins conjoined at the head and pioneering a procedure for children with unremitting seizure disorders. Carson's "against all odds" determination coupled with his profound faith in the Lord echoes Scalpel's own narrative of trusting God while leaning into complicated patient presentations amidst austere Amazonian conditions. Guests were touched by the fragrant aroma of Christ which permeated all aspects of our Gala Program. Donations of \$350K+ are still being generously given, thanks be to God!
- Build out of our orthotic/prosthetic/ rehabilitation center advances amidst the rainy season and is projected to be completed this Fall, Lord willing!
- Expansion of our leadership team, and successful onboarding of a Director of Annual Giving, Program Manager of Operations & Development, Creative Director, and Media Consultant have helped add depth, breadth, and professionalism in meeting our

- Transitioning of German Prosthetist Daniel Müller and family to Pucallpa from Diospi Suyana Hospital this summer.
